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MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The American Boccaccio Association held its annual meeting during the Modern Language Association convention in Chicago, on December 30, 1990. President Victoria Kirkham opened with a brief business meeting. She called upon the members to volunteer to serve as regional representatives or to nominate individuals who might be willing to serve. Regional representatives are primarily responsible for organizing Boccaccio sessions at relevant nearby conferences. Regarding the *Lectura Boccaccii* series, she announced that volume 1 is under consideration at a university press. Day 2 readings have already been offered by Professors David Wallace (2, 3) and Michael Sherberg (2, 6). Upcoming readings will include Christopher Kleinhenz (2, 5) at the 1991 Kalamazoo conference, and Susan Noakes (2, 8) at the 1992 Kalamazoo conference. Finally, President Kirkham announced that Professors Vittore Branca and Francesco Mazzoni have been named honorary members of the organization. Professor Branca is widely known for his extensive work on Boccaccio; Professor Mazzoni is president of the Ente Nazionale Giovanni Boccaccio in Rome.

Three speakers delivered papers as part of the annual meeting. Professor Michelangelo Picone, of the University of Zurich, spoke on "Lo sfondo di una novella di Boccaccio: *Decameron* 4, 1." Professor Patricia Grieve of Columbia University then spoke on "From Pagan Court to Christian Kingdom: The Relation of Il Filocolo and the *Crónica de Flores y Blancaflor*." Finally, Professor Eric Nicholson of the State University College of New York at Purchase gave a talk entitled "The Theater, the Plague, and the *Decameron*."
