Message from the President

Dear Colleagues,

As the pages of this Newsletter demonstrate, we have an abundance of good news to report for the first half of 2022. The Author promises his readers in the Introduction to Day One of the Decameron that there is a "bellissimo piano e dilettevole" after the "montagna aspra e erta" of the plague's description. Indeed, we have had several recent opportunities for beauty and delight which have been welcome after our years of social isolation and distance. We found our first beautiful and delightful plain in Padua, where we held our fifth Triennial Conference from June 6th to the 8th. Fittingly titled "International Boccaccio/Boccaccio internazionale," the conference involved an impressive number of scholars from Italy, Europe, Israel, Australia and the Americas: more than one hundred presenters shared research to an equally impressive number of individuals in attendance.

Over the course of three days, we listened to four wonderful keynote lectures by Lucia Battaglia Ricci, Theodore Cachey, Cormac Ó Cuilleanáin, and Gina Psaki. We visited the exhibit "Boccaccio a Padova: Libri di Boccaccio tra medioevo e prima età moderna" curated by Laura Banella, Giovanna Bergantino and Rino Modonutti, with the assistance of Laura De Luisa and Giulia Simeoni, at the Biblioteca antica del Seminario vescovile. And we were treated to a special performance, "Decameron: canzoni e storie. Un viaggio nel capolavoro di Boccaccio tra racconto e musica," with none other than David Riondino and Maurizio Fiorilla, together with the musical accompaniment of exceptional musicians.

At the end of our conference, we recognized the outstanding service of four individuals: Simone Marchesi, for his service as past President of the ABA; Fabian Alfie, for his service as past Treasurer of the ABA; Michael Papio, for his generous donation of time and expertise in creating a new website for our Association; and Susanna Barsella, for her extraordinary leadership with our paleography seminar initiative.

Those three days of intellectual exchange and reunion were a resounding success, for which we must recognize the individuals and institutions who made it all possible. The ABA is indebted to the University of Padua for serving as our generous hosts during the years of its eight-hundredth anniversary (1222-2022). The novel idea for this international conference came from Valerio Cappozzo, Vice President, whom I thank profusely for encouraging the Association to bring its triennial conference to Italy for the first time in the history of the ABA. Rino Modonutti, Associate Professor of Medieval Latin Literature at the University of Padua, served together with Valerio as our main conference organizers. We cannot thank Rino enough for his leadership, generosity and time working on the planning and smooth execution of our conference.

Boccaccio a Padova

Libri di Boccaccio tra medioevo e prima età moderna

Biblioteca antica del Seminario Vescovile 16 maggio - 8 giugno 2022



Nel marzo del 1351 Giovanni Boccaccio venne a Padova per far visita a Petrarca, inizlando così una relazione con ila città che sarebbe andata ben oltre la sua vita, intrecciandosi con la sua fortuna tra Medioevo e Rinascimento, e più oltre lungo i secoli. A Padova sono stati infatti prodotti libri importanti delle sue opere, manoscritti e a stampa, fino alla ancora capitale edizione di Tutte le opere. diretta da Vittore Branca, professore a Padova, tra il 1964 e il 1998. E motti attri libri del Certaldese sono arrivati, da vicino a da lontano, ad arricchire continuamente i tescri di cultura della città. In concomitanza con la quinta conferenza triennale dell'American Boccaccio Association (Dipartinento) di stutti linguistici e letterari, 6 del verse materializzazioni librarie delle opere di Boccaccio prodotte, spesso proprio a Padova, tra Medioevo, Umanesimo e prima età moderna, e conservate nella Biblioteca antica el Seminario di Padova. We are grateful to the Dipartimento di studi linguistici e letterari, and its Director, Sergio Bozzola, as well as Alessandra Petrina, the President of the Scuola di scienze umane, sociali e del patrimonio culturale, for sponsoring our event. Monica Salvadori, the Prorettrice of the Patrimonio artistico, storico e culturale, graciously attended our opening session on behalf of the Magnifica Rettrice. Our generous sponsors include the Ente Nazionale Giovanni Boccaccio, Studi sul Boccaccio (Olschki), and SISMEL. We must also thank the organizing team that gave us support on the ground for the conference: Laura Banella, Nicoletta Bisogno, Nicola Carpentieri, Giacomo Comiati and Laura De Luisa. Students from the Liceo Tito Livio di Padova and the Liceo Ferrari di Este served as guides and provided practical assistance as well. International and local scholars and students came together to make our first international conference in Italy a fantastic experience for all. The excitement of the Triennial Conference followed us from Padua to Rome and then Florence and Certaldo for our first onsite Paleography Seminar, titled "Manuscript Culture in Boccaccio's Times." The Seminar addresses methodological and practical concerns related to the study of Latin and vernacular paleography. The teaching program includes introductions to the major Florentine and Roman libraries, paleography classes using Latin and vernacular manuscripts, and transcription practice.

This initiative is the fruit of a two-year collaboration with the Ente Nazionale Giovanni Boccaccio. In May 2022, our nine participants attended six online seminars with our instructors-Professors Irene Ceccherini, Marco Cursi, Teresa De Robertis, Maddalena Signorini, Stefano Zamponi, and Claudia Montuschi-in preparation for their work in the libraries from June 13th to the 18th. Our intensive week began in Rome with Professors Cursi and Signorini in the Vatican Libraries, where we studied for two days in the Salone Sistino, also under the supervision of Claudia Montuschi, Director of the Manuscript Department of the Vatican Apostolic Library. We are grateful to Dr. Montuschi and the Prefect of the Vatican Apostolic Library, Monsignor Cesare Pasini, for granting us the extraordinary privilege of studying in the frescoed Salone Sistino. After our days in the Vatican Library, we visited two exhibits in the National Library of the Accademia dei Lincei and Corsiniana Library. The following three days were spent in Florence with Professors Zamponi, De Robertis and Ceccherini, at the Biblioteca Riccardiana, the Biblioteca Medicea Laurenziana, and the Nazionale.






Our rewarding days of study came to a celebratory conclusion in Certaldo, where the Ente Nazionale Giovanni Boccaccio generously hosted our group. We had a tour of the Casa del Boccaccio and the Palazzo Pretorio, and then enjoyed a spectacular evening at the town's "cena medievale." Professors Maurizio Fiorilla and Elsa Filosa delivered two presentations (or "lezioni non magistralis") the next day before our departure.

We are currently in the planning stages of the 2023 Paleography Seminar. Two committees with representatives from the ABA and the ENGB have been formed to carry out the planning and organizational work for another successful iteration next year. We continue to offer modest grants for graduate student participants, just as we have funded graduate student travel to our triennial conferences. Students have written enthusiastically about their experiences with us this summer; we invite you to visit their the pages our (https://boccaccio-usa.org/initiatives.html#). We plan to launch a fundraising campaign to offset the expenses to attend the Paleography Seminar. The generosity of our membership would ensure the future of graduate student participation in this unique formative experience. We hope that you will consider donating to this new and promising initiative which we hope to offer on an annual basis.

In short, these months have been essential to the vitality of our diverse scholarly community. The ABA has solidified its connections with our primary interlocutors and institutions abroad, defining us as an international society. In this regard, we are particularly happy to have increased and strengthened our collaborations with the Ente Nazionale Giovanni Boccaccio, with whom we will continue to organize the Paleography Seminar, as well as other initiatives to promote the study of Boccaccio.







We are especially pleased to announce that Professor Stefano Zamponi has been inducted as an **Honorary Member of the American Boccaccio Association**, which took effect in June 2022 by the unanimous election of the ABA officers. While it is impossible to summarize his extensive *curriculum vitae*, I will attempt to give a brief glimpse of his several formidable accomplishments here.

President of the ENGB since 2010, Stefano Zamponi is Professor Emeritus of Latin Paleography at the University of Florence, where he was the Chair of Medieval and Renaissance Studies, the Chair of History, Archaeology, Geography, Art and Performatives Arts, and the Director of the Doctoral Program in "Filologia e tradizione dei testi." He served as the Direttore scientifico of the census of Italian manuscripts in Tuscany from 1992 to 2013, and was the founder and President of Associazione Italiana Manoscritti Datati (1994-2007). He was a member of the Consiglio Scientifico of the Società Internazionale per lo studio del Medioevo Latino (Certosa del Galluzzo - Firenze).



He has been the Director of the Archivio Capitolare of Pistoia 2009-2020, and Officer (2000-2005) and President of the Comité International de Paléographie Latine (2005 to 2015). Professor Zamponi has authored and edited several volumes, including those in the series Manoscritti datati d'Italia, Manoscritti medievali del Veneto e Manoscritti medievali della Toscana. Most recently, he has published Le ragioni della scrittura. Piccoli scritti di paleografia, edited by Teresa De Robertis and Nicoletta Giovè Marchioli (Viella Libreria Editrice, 2021). We are delighted to recognize Professor Zamponi for his plentiful and wide-ranging contributions to our field with this honor.

We continue to organize sessions at the annual conventions of the Modern Language Association and the Renaissance Society of America. We will relaunch our Virtual Brigata and Member Book Launch presentations during 2022-23 and encourage you to present your current research or recent publications in those online series. Please read further in this newsletter for more good news about our recent Giuseppe Velli Prize winners in the two categories that were recognized (best graduate essay and best undergraduate essay). The Lectura Boccaccii series has seen the publication of its sixth volume! The Decameron Ninth Day in Perspective, edited by Susanna Barsella and Simone Marchesi, was just published with the University of Toronto Press. We offer our heartfelt congratulations to our Velli Prize winners, as well as to Susanna, Simone, and contributors to their volume.

It is an honor and a pleasure for me to serve such a vital and engaged Association with my dedicated fellow officers: Valerio Cappozzo, Vice-President; Maggie Fritz-Morkin, Secretary; and Elsa Filosa, Treasurer. Without them none of these ideas would have become a reality. As our days in Padua, Rome, Florence and Certaldo made abundantly clear, our Association is stronger than ever.

"We all know what is absolutely necessary for a humanistic scholar to not lose the straightway: things of beauty and good colleagues. During the ENGB/ABA Paleography Seminar we had both. The splendor of the Libraries was reflected in the individual codices we analyzed during the week, and the analytical description of the manuscripts has become a magical place where you can recreate the lost gold from a coat of arms with the lucky one of a decorated drop capital. We learned to recognize the different shape of the same letters - from the gothic's angularity to the roundish stroke of the merchant script - and to perceive the evanescent writing of the palimpsest sheet. And while you are measuring manuscripts with the ruler and leafing through the pages, someone might suddenly announce a break to admire the anthology of Dante's works designing and shaping by Boccaccio or a recently rediscover manuscript with Petrarch's notes and marginalia. Boccaccio leaded us with his writings, his drawings and the shape of his books, but it was my new friends and Professors who showed me how perceive beauty where I could no longer see it."


